9:05-9:35 (30 min)	"Exploring the Job Analysis of Water Treatment Plant Operator " Eric Shea - Washington Environmental Training Center (WETRC) A job analysis is a systematic process used to identify the tasks, duties, and responsibilities required for a given type of position. For water system operators, these analyses are used for many purposes, from creating job descriptions by utility employers to establishing the criteria for water operator certification exams. Recently the Water Supply Technology program at Green River College had an opportunity to develop a job analysis for the position of water treatment plant operator that is specific to Washington. This session will explore the method and results of this analysis and see how the work of the water treatment plant operator in Washington compares to the U.S.

11:50-12:20 (30 min)	"Cross Connection Control & Backflow Prevention" Blake Nylund - Thurston Public Utilities Overview on cross-connection control (CCC) and backflow preventer testing topics (TBA) from both a compliance manager perspective (purveyor) and private backflow tester prospective.
12:20-12:50 (30 min)	"PFAS Mitigation Strategy & Lessons Learned by a Regional Water Provider" Marshall Meyer - Lakewood Water District This presentation explores practical, effective approaches for addressing PFAS contamination in drinking water sources. Attendees will gain actionable insights into monitoring strategies, including recommended frequency and methods that can be incorporated into routine operational practices. Focusing on water quality and public health protection, the session highlights cost-effective solutions water systems can implement to manage PFAS challenges. Like many utilities nationwide, Lakewood Water District has detected PFAS in several groundwater sources. In response, the District has developed and is implementing a comprehensive mitigation strategy to protect its water supply. This strategy includes a combination of treatment and source replacement, such as constructing new wells and installing two granular activated carbon (GAC) treatment systems. The presentation will share key considerations, project timelines, and lessons learned from Lakewood's real-world experience. Attendees will walk away with a better understanding of how to develop and execute a PFAS mitigation plan tailored to their own system's needs.

1:00-1:30 (30 min)	"Communication and Feedback That Builds Trust" Kim Conant - FIT HR Effective communication is about far more than the words we choose. In this session, participants will explore practical communication techniques that strengthen relationships, reduce misunderstandings, and make performance feedback more productive. We will examine how unconscious nonverbal communication can unintentionally undermine our message, learn the four essential steps of active listening, identify common communication pitfalls that prevent genuine understanding, and practice using the SBI (Situation–Behavior–Impact) feedback model to deliver clear, objective, and constructive performance feedback. Participants will leave with practical tools they can immediately apply to build trust, minimize conflict, and foster stronger, more cohesive teams.
